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E-safety notification

Over the course of the pandemic lots of children have been given more freedom to access devices and subsequently websites, games and apps, so this is a good time to talk to your child(ren) about internet safety. Last weekend, one of our children was involved in an incident on Roblox but it could have been any similar game with a group chat facility, in which they were sent inappropriate messages by someone pretending to be much younger than they actually were. Luckily this was spotted very quickly but it does show how important it is to keep an eye on your child's internet usage. A few basic rules would help prevent similar incidents:

- Explain to your child that anyone that asks them not to tell mummy or daddy is not to be trusted and use this as a starting point to discuss various internet safety scenarios
- Limit time on the device
- Use the device in a communal area (kitchen or lounge)
- Make sure mobile phones aren't taken up to bed (this is key)
- If you can, it really is worth setting up parental locks and filters

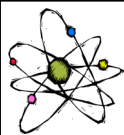
Shoe Shop

Science Spot

Exciting fieldwork in Year 2: This term Year 2's topic is 'Springwatch'. We began with Roald Dahl's 'Fantastic Mr Fox' which we have been studying in Literacy and as part of our Science lessons we have looked at how we know if something is 'living', different animal groups, how offspring in each group are born and develop into adults, food chains, how we know if an animal is a carnivore, herbivore or omnivore by looking at their jaws and limbs and how they are suited to their habitat. This week we have explored Lollycock's Field, the River Slea and the surrounding fields to give us a more 'hands-on' experience of all of this, as well as micro-habitats. We saw lots of minibeasts, particularly ladybirds, as well as ducks and lambs amongst other creatures, and lots of different plants, many of which we could name. We were surprised at how much is on our doorstep.

Firstly, for any children wishing to do their Bikeability training and able to pay Outspoken Training are running some holiday courses in various locations including in Lincoln on the 31st May and 1st June. The courses are delivered by qualified, professional instructors and run over two days from 10.00am - 2.30pm with a 30 minute supervised lunch break each day (8 hours of training in total). The other event you may be interested in is the **Sustrans Big Pedal** (<https://bigpedal.org.uk/>). The idea is to encourage pupils and their parents to engage in more active travel improving health, improving air quality and reducing traffic congestion.
