## Year 4 Assembly


On Tuesday Year 4 took part in a super assembly all about the Victorians, their medley of Oliver songs was brilliant. Thank you parents for all your support.

## Science Spot

Growing future scientists: One of our aims in school, is to inspire future scientists through our exciting and inspiring science lessons and to encourage children's enthusiasm and interest in any area of science. By capturing and encouraging this early enthusiasm, we can be setting our children up for a fulfilling and rewarding future career.

Many children are fascinated by dinosaurs and the fossilised remains of species which inhabited the earth millions of years ago. In Year 6, there is a whole topic on such creatures, and to help our understanding, we have a visit later this month from Palaeo-Man, Jules Howard.

Jules is a wonderful example of where an early enthusiasm for science can lead to an exciting future. Although he hadn't really thought much about the natural world before the age of 13, all that changed after an encounter with a frog – or lots of frogs, and frog spawn, and newts and water beetles.

He had gone to a friend's house to play football. It was early spring and there were frogs everywhere. Jules had wandered away from the game to have a look in the pond and he was transfixed. Lying flat on the grass, he stayed deadly still and silent, watching frogs, frog spawn, newts, water beetles and mosquito larvae in this strange, weird, watery world.

At school, Jules was okay at science but he was often bored (sadly, his science lessons weren't as interesting as those at the Alvey.) Jules felt that the underlying principle of science was about curiosity and creativity and finding answers for himself, about all sorts of weird things (a bit like we get to do here.)

After his A Levels, Jules went to the University of Liverpool to study Zoology and Animal Biology, then he completed a Master of Science degree (MSc) in Evolutionary Psychology. Jules is now a wildlife expert, zoology correspondent, author, science-writer and presenter. He writes regularly for The Guardian, BBC Wildlife Magazine, often contributes to the BBC AND gets to visit enthusiastic budding scientists at the William Alvey School.
