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A YEAR 3 VIKING HOOK

This week. Year 3 went to The Lincoln Museum to inspire the children at the beginning of their Viking topic. The children were given a tour of the museum, and the guide explained how Lincoln looked before and during the Viking era. They were given the chance to handle a variety of different Viking artefacts (or replicas which were just as good as the real thing). They discussed what they thought they were and then what we can learn from them about life in Viking Lincoln. Another activity was becoming archaeologists, where they got their hands dirty and carefully dug in a container to find different artefacts, marked where they were found and what they thought they were. After that, two people were chosen to be curators of a museum exhibition and the rest of the group had to show the items they had found to persuade them to include it in

their exhibition.

The third activity was Life in Viking Lincoln. They began by learning about the clothes they would wear, and what they would have been made out of. The children were then given the opportunity to dress up. After that, they were taken to a replica Viking shop and learnt about how the Vikings would trade some goods as well as using coins to pay for others. The children were split into groups and set a challenge: they were given some coins and were set the task of buying enough food for a day of balanced meals, spending the least amount possible. This meant they needed to haggle with the shopkeeper. Year 3 had an amazing day and the children were all exceptionally behaved as always!
